## INTRODUCTION

Los Angeles County is the largest local voting jurisdiction in the nation with more than 5.7 million registered voters residing across 4,100 square miles. The Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk (RR/CC) is responsible for administering local, state, and federal elections and ensuring all voters have the knowledge, access, and opportunity to participate in our democratic process. The RR/CC continuously and diligently works to improve the voting experience through its publicly owned and publicly designed voting model, Voting Solutions for All People (VSAP), while removing potential barriers to or obstacles that may prevent a voter from participating. The VSAP solution is a modern, accessible, and secure voting experience that seeks to ensure voters in the County have greater opportunities to vote by providing expanded options in a manner that is convenient, accessible, and secure, and that aligns with efforts to expand voting options throughout California.

The State of California (State) has also taken unprecedented steps to broaden access and modernize voting by redefining how, when, and where a voter may cast their ballot. The California Voter's Choice Act (VCA), Election Code Section 4005, was adopted to facilitate this access.

**In this document, there is detailed information on LA County RR/CC's plans to:**

1. **Educate** voters about their voting rights and options;
2. **Promote** inclusive voter participation, engaging voters with language and disability access needs;
3. **Locate, distribute, and maintain** Vote Centers and Ballot Drop Box locations, including Vote Center layouts, voting equipment, and staffing plans;
4. **Implement** security and contingency plans; and
5. **Next steps.**

## VOTER'S CHOICE ACT

The VCA provides a foundational framework for counties to offer expanded voting options enabling greater flexibility and convenience for voters. The core elements of the VCA include:

- Vote by Mail services, including secure and convenient Ballot Drop Boxes and drop-off locations available starting 29 days before Election Day (see Section 2- B).
- Flexible in-person voting options allow voters to cast their ballot at any Vote Center within their county of residence over an 11-day period.
- Enhanced voter services and assistance provided at Vote Centers, including Conditional Voter Registration, also known as same-day registration.

Successful execution of the VCA requires counties to carefully examine existing conditions and



processes, including voting technology, budgetary capacity, voting locations, demographics, and community engagement.

## VCA IMPLEMENTATION IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY

To implement the VCA in Los Angeles County, the RR/CC developed an infrastructure based on its existing transformational VSAP principles, focused on the needs of voters, balanced with validation by advisory committees of industry experts in design, accessibility, security, technology, election administration, academics, and public input from stakeholders, community-based organizations (CBOs), and members of the public. Utilizing a combination of stakeholder engagement, surveys, focus groups, technical analysis, and user testing, the RR/CC set a precedent, leading the complex process of developing a new voting experience that satisfies State and local requirements, meets the needs of voters, aligns with national voting system security standards, and has the flexibility to adapt to changes in voter behavior, regulation, and technology.

In the March 3, 2020 Presidential Primary Election, the County implemented the VSAP solution which introduced voters to an experience that included a fully accessible and secure Ballot Marking Device, an Electronic Pollbook (ePollbook), an Interactive Sample Ballot, Remote Accessible Vote by Mail, a modernized Tally System, a 11-day in-person voting period, Vote Centers, and the Mobile/Flex Vote Center Program. In this initial implementation of the VCA and VSAP, over 1.14 million voters voted using their Vote by Mail ballot, and another 1 million voted at a Vote Center. These numbers represented an increase of approximately 75% in Vote by Mail turnout and 42% of total turnout from the previous Countywide primary election in June 2018, which saw approximately 665,000 voters vote using their Vote by Mail ballot. In a survey conducted by the RR/CC, 70% of voters reported an overall neutral or positive experience.

Immediately following the March 3, 2020, Presidential Primary Election, the County Board of Supervisors (Board) directed the RR/CC to adopt the provisions of the VCA as described in Elections Code 4005 and 4007(c), requiring the County to mail all registered voters a Vote by Mail ballot. This early adoption provided voters with an opportunity to vote safely from home without risking their health or their community's health during the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic. This meant an increase of approximately 2.5 million Vote by Mail ballots were mailed in the November 3, 2020, General Election compared to the March 3, 2020, Presidential Primary Election. In this election, over 3.4 million voters voted using their Vote by Mail ballot, and approximately 913,000 voted in person. This marked a historical 4.3 million ballots cast and an increase in turnout from 58% to 76% compared to the previous Countywide General Election in November 2018. A survey conducted by the RR/CC also saw an increase in voter satisfaction with their experience, with 94% of survey respondents reporting a neutral or positive voting experience.

Between January 2020 and August 2025, the RR/CC administered elections under the VCA model, including three Countywide primary elections (March 2020, June 2022, March 2024), and three

Countywide general elections (November 2020, November 2022, November 2024). Additionally, during this same period, the RR/CC conducted 25 special, municipal, and local elections, including a Statewide Special Election (September 2021).

## **SECTION 1 – VOTER SERVICES, OUTREACH, AND EDUCATION**

The RR/CC will continue to educate and raise awareness among registered and eligible non-registered voters about their voting rights, voting options, the VCA, the VSAP voting experience, and how to access voting resources through a series of strategic public education and outreach campaigns. Since the implementation and adoption of VSAP and the VCA, the RR/CC has implemented large-scale multilingual and multicultural voter education campaigns that engaged millions of voters throughout the County. These campaigns utilized a variety of tactics and strategies that provided voters with critical messages in more than a dozen languages and directed voters to publicly available information and resources on the RR/CC website and the toll-free hotline. The RR/CC will continue to develop and implement campaigns utilizing data-driven best practices, approaches, and communication platforms available in the market.

Additionally, the RR/CC will continue to utilize and leverage its relationships with local and multilingual news media to gain earned media opportunities with TV, radio, print, and digital news outlets. These opportunities include, but are not limited to, conducting interviews, media round tables, press briefings, and inviting media to various public-facing operations to learn about the voting and elections processes. These engagements with local media provide the public with trusted information on upcoming election events, critical deadlines, voter registration opportunities, and voting options.

Further, the RR/CC will continue to collaborate with long-standing partners, including, but not limited to, community-based organizations, County stakeholders, advocacy committees, municipalities, high schools, community colleges, and universities. Through these partnerships, the RR/CC will collaborate and provide outreach materials in multiple languages and accessible formats to raise awareness and educate our vast multicultural communities on how they can take advantage of voting opportunities, promote civic engagement, and voter participation. Through this approach, RR/CC builds trust, reduces language and accessibility barriers, and ensures equitable access to election information for all voters.

### **1-A. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

To effectively outreach to the public and provide information on how, when, and where people can vote, the RR/CC will continue to work with partner agencies within the County, other governmental agencies, City Clerks, and community-based organizations (CBOs). The RR/CC will conduct community forums and events, utilize social media and ethnic media channels to reach underrepresented and hard-to-reach communities, and provide training and materials to ensure that a consistent message is being provided to the public.

To support these activities, the RR/CC hosts regular meetings with committees of specific stakeholders, including:

- **Community Voter Outreach Committee (CVOC).** CVOC serves as the voter education and outreach network and aligns with newly adopted requirements in California Election Code Section 4005 (a)(9)(D). The RR/CC hosts at least two (2) CVOC meetings virtually each year, and in even-numbered years, additional in-person meetings as needed.
- **Language Access Advisory Committee (LAAC).** LAAC serves as the language access advisory committee, as required by California Election Code Section 4005 (a)(9)(A). The RR/CC hosts at least three (3) LAAC meetings virtually each year, with additional subcommittee meetings for project development and joint events as needed.
- **Voting Accessibility Advisory Committee (VAAC).** VAAC serves as the voting accessibility advisory committee, as required by California Election Code Section 4005 (a)(9)(B). The RR/CC hosts at least three (3) VAAC meetings virtually each year, with additional subcommittee meetings for project development and joint events as needed.

#### i. Community Voter Outreach Committee (CVOC)

Since the 1990s, the RR/CC has convened regular meetings of CVOC to offer an opportunity for stakeholders, including cities, organizations that represent voters with language or disability access needs, partisan groups and campaign representatives, voter registration and education groups, and civil rights groups to meet with RR/CC staff and network with each other. These meetings serve as a forum to discuss election calendars, RR/CC plans and goals, and to provide stakeholders with an opportunity to ask questions, offer feedback, and collaborate on outreach strategies to support voter education and participation. Since 2020, these meetings have become largely virtual meetings, expanding accessibility and participation, and drawing, on average 50 to 100 attendees per meeting.

#### ii. Language Access Advisory Committee (LAAC)

The RR/CC provides language assistance to voters with Limited English Proficiency (LEP) per federal and state law requirements. Given Los Angeles County's population, the RR/CC provides assistance in more languages than any other jurisdiction in the country - 18. To effectively conduct in-language voter education and outreach, provide accurate translations of voting materials, recruit and train translators and bilingual election workers, and address other issues to enable LEP voters to vote independently and meaningfully, the RR/CC hosts regular meetings of the Language Access Advisory Committee, which has been in existence since 2017.

The LAAC plays an essential role in educating Los Angeles County's LEP community about upcoming elections and their voting options. LAAC members assist by hosting community events and distributing translated materials. LAAC meetings provide a forum to talk about topics such as outreach opportunities, vote center placement, and multilingual election worker recruitment needs.

Examples of recent events/projects that RR/CC has hosted, co-hosted, or supported with LAAC members include:

- **August 6, 2025, “We Speak Your Language: 50 Years of Language Access and Empowerment”:** RR/CC celebrated the 50th anniversary of Section 203 of the Voting Rights Act, resulting in Los Angeles County’s expansion of voting rights through language access, with an all-day event including a City Clerk Summit to train and expose city clerks from 88 cities to the need, methods, and tools for providing multilingual services. The RR/CC produced a 7-minute video featuring interviews with various community leaders who have been instrumental in crafting language access in the county and nationally. Working with Supervisor Hilda Solis’ office, the RR/CC honored six (6) LAAC member organizations for their continued commitment to expanding language access.

- **August 7, 2025, CAUSE Mock Election:** Center for Asian Americans United for Self Empowerment (CAUSE) hosted a Summer Soiree featuring a mock election for students running to represent a state assembly district. Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/ County Clerk Dean Logan opened and closed the mock polls for voting at the event, which drew more than 100 attendees.
- **LAAC subcommittee projects in 2023-2025 include:** Review and distribution of multilingual materials, sharing information and resources to multilingual communities, promoting outreach events, recruitment of multilingual election workers, as well as recruitment of partners and organizations to join the LAAC.

### iii. Voting Accessibility Advisory Committee (VAAC)

The RR/CC is dedicated to ensuring accessibility for voters with disabilities in accordance with federal and state requirements. To empower voters with disabilities to vote independently and meaningfully, the RR/CC established the Voter Accessibility Advisory Committee (VAAC) in 2006. Since then, the RR/CC has hosted regular meetings and activities for 20 years to ensure effective voter education, outreach, and an accessible voting experience.



The VAAC plays an important role by facilitating advice on the evaluation and improvement of existing accessibility programs and suggesting new initiatives to better serve voters with disabilities. The goal of the committee is to enable all voters to have the same levels of access and participation as other voters.

Some examples of recent events and projects that the RR/CC has hosted, co-hosted, or supported with VAAC members include:

- **2022 Disability Awareness Training Video and Voter Education Public Service Announcement (PSA):** VAAC members participated and co-produced an Election Worker [training video](#) and PSA with the RR/CC to promote awareness and educate staff and voters.



- **2023 Accessibility Course:** The RR/CC Vote Center Assessment and Recruitment Team hosted several learning opportunities for internal staff and external stakeholders, such as city clerks, where they helped build empathy through simulating some of the challenges faced by voters with disabilities. Participants were asked to use a wheelchair to navigate a course of changes in levels, tight pathways, and turn spaces. They were also given the opportunity to experience an obstacle course of hazards encountered by people with visual impairments by wearing a blindfold and using a cane to detect barriers. These exercises highlighted the importance of vigilance by County staff in identifying and removing barriers where possible or by facility managers who could permanently remove barriers or prevent the creation of future barriers.
- **2024 Voting Accessibility Advisory Committee Material Clearinghouse Subcommittee:** The VAAC established this subcommittee to generate a step-by-step brochure for people with disabilities to find information related to accessible voting options and resources available in Los Angeles County. A customized version of this brochure for the General Election in November 2024 was also generated and distributed to all VAAC members prior to the election. The brochure, “Understanding Your Options: A Step-by-Step Info Guide for Voters with Disabilities” included detailed information to guide voters with disabilities on how to

register to vote, what options existed for accessible in-person voting, what accessibility features existed in the Ballot Marking Device (BMD), and how to use Remote Accessible Vote by Mail, Curbside Voting, Audio Sample Ballot and other services.

- **2025 VAAC Accessibility Tour:** On Sept. 17, 2025, the RR/CC organized an opportunity for VAAC organizations to observe the RR/CC team surveying a Vote Center location for accessibility challenges. Each year, the RR/CC team conducts an extensive survey of target sites to identify whether they meet the requirements to become a vote center. The VAAC members observed the RR/CC team survey of the Gene Autry Museum and provided useful recommendations on how to find locations or mitigate challenges to provide voters with disabilities an accessible experience.

These meetings are a forum to discuss topics such as outreach opportunities, Vote Center siting, Election Worker recruitment needs, the evaluation and enhancement of existing accessibility programs, and the proposal of new initiatives to better serve voters with disabilities.

In addition to the VAAC's ongoing work to provide guidance and recommendations to improve accessibility and ensure equitable participation in our elections, the VAAC:

- **Supports the Mobile Voting Program:** Assists with identifying and recruiting Flex Vote Center locations, ensuring that one-day voting sites are accessible and strategically placed in communities with unique needs. The VAAC provides insight into which communities would most benefit from flexible, one-day sites, including areas with transportation challenges or populations with limited access to traditional Vote Centers. Their recommendations help ensure that the Mobile Voting Program expands access and provides meaningful options for voters with disabilities.
- **Advises on Digital Accessibility:** Reviews the RR/CC's websites and digital tools to provide user experience feedback and design recommendations, helping to improve accessibility and usability for voters with disabilities. The VAAC has shared input on navigation, readability, and ADA compliance, ensuring that online resources are inclusive and intuitive. These recommendations guide ongoing improvements and confirmation on the RR/CC's digital websites and platforms.

## **1-B. MEDIA AND PUBLIC OUTREACH**

The RR/CC implements comprehensive, data-driven voter education and outreach campaigns designed to reach Los Angeles County's diverse electorate. Building on lessons learned from recent large-scale election cycles, the RR/CC outreach model integrates multilingual and multicultural messaging, community partnerships, and modern media tactics to ensure equitable access to accurate, timely, and trusted information.

Our approach is informed by previous voter education campaign reports and performance metrics, voter surveys, and nationally recognized research on voter behavior and media consumption trends.

The RR/CC continues to use a data-driven approach to best determine how to educate the public about their voting options and rights, along with directing them to trusted resources available to them online and through our toll-free hotline.

### **i. Broadcast and Ethnic Media**

The RR/CC engages with mainstream and local ethnic broadcast networks (television and radio) to maximize visibility and cultural relevance. Public service announcements, live interviews, and targeted paid media placements deliver critical messages on upcoming elections, registration information,



language access, voting options, and election security. These efforts extend across dozens of English and non-English language stations with tailored scripts and presenters to better connect with community audiences.

## ii. Print Media

The RR/CC partners with local, regional, and ethnic newspapers, magazines, and newsletters to reach voters who prefer or rely on print media – especially in linguistically diverse, geographically isolated, or older voter populations. These placements carry clear, actionable information that directs readers to in-language online tools or our voter hotline.

## iii. Digital and Streaming Media

In recent election cycles, the RR/CC has expanded its digital footprint with multilingual video and static content on social platforms, news websites, and streaming services. Digital and streaming media continue to play a key role in reaching high-priority target demographics, including young voters, first-time voters, and language minority communities.

## iv. Social Media

The RR/CC continues to leverage its strong and growing presence across Facebook, LinkedIn, Instagram, X (formerly Twitter), YouTube, and emerging platforms to inform and engage voters. Building on past campaigns, RR/CC uses multilingual, culturally relevant content across organic and paid formats, incorporating short-form video, interactive graphics, and targeted ad placements to reach priority audiences such as young voters, first-time voters, and historically underrepresented communities.

Social media remains one of the most cost-effective methods to deliver high-volume, high-frequency messages to voters, while also enabling two-way conversation. This allows the RR/CC to engage directly with voters with proactive election information, to address questions and misinformation, and direct voters to our official websites and trusted resources to make informed decisions.

## v. Email Marketing

The RR/CC continues to use its extensive voter email database to deliver timely, trusted updates directly to voters' inboxes in their preferred language. Previous campaigns have shown that targeted, in-language email outreach, especially when paired with multilingual messaging and clear calls-to-action, effectively drives voter engagement with online tools and resources.

Messages will include election information, critical dates and deadlines, voting opportunities, and links to personalized tools such as the Interactive Sample Ballot or locator tools to Vote Centers or Ballot Drop Boxes. Email campaigns are also used to highlight accessibility resources, language assistance options, and election security information, ensuring voters can plan ahead and vote with confidence.

## vi. Out-of-Home Media



The RR/CC continues to utilize strategically placed out-of-home advertising to reach residents where they live, work, and commute. In previous election cycles, billboards, bus shelters, and transit wraps have been placed in high-traffic areas and in communities with historically low rates of voter participation, ensuring equitable geographic coverage. Additionally, billboards on highways have been leveraged. This will continue to be explored to ensure key election information reaches diverse and geographically isolated communities within the County.

## vii. Rideshare/Transportation Companies

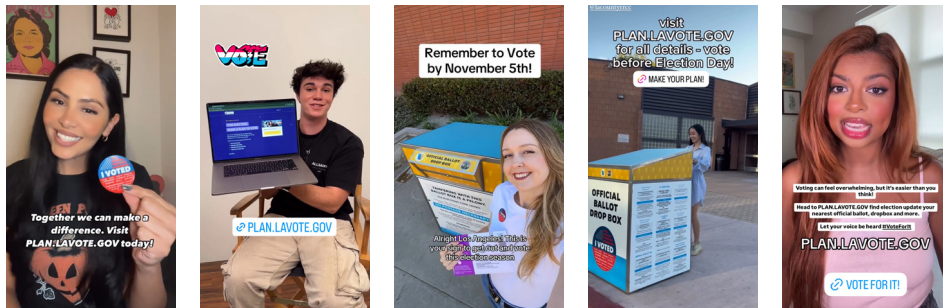
In recent elections, partnerships with rideshare companies, Metro, and other transportation providers have successfully increased voter awareness of free or discounted transportation to Vote Centers. The RR/CC will build on this model by expanding outreach through onboard ads, platform notifications, and physical signage at transportation hubs.

These partnerships are also leveraged to deliver voter registration reminders and promote voting options, particularly in communities with limited transportation access.

## viii. Influencers and Trusted Messengers

The RR/CC will continue to partner with local influencers, community leaders, and trusted messengers to amplify official election information. Past efforts have shown that messages delivered by familiar and credible voices – whether entertainers, artists, faith leaders, or grassroots organizers – are more likely to be acted upon and shared within communities.

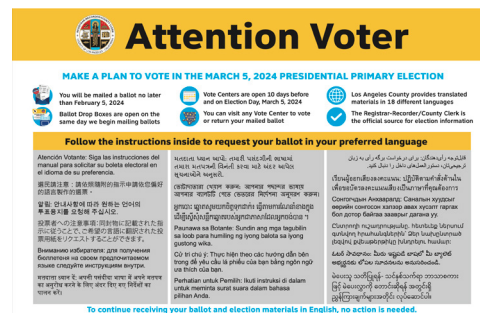
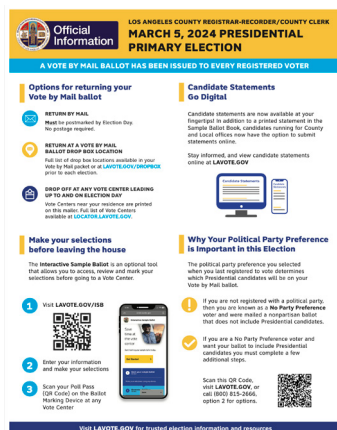
These partnerships will prioritize diversity in language, cultural background, and geographic representation, ensuring a broad reach across Los Angeles County's electorate. Influencers are provided with ready-to-share community toolkits, including graphics, videos, and sample posts, to maintain message consistency and accuracy.



## ix. Direct Mailing Outreach

In addition to the Sample Ballot and Vote by Mail packets, the RR/CC continues to leverage targeted, multilingual direct mail campaigns to provide voters with clear, accessible, and actionable information about upcoming elections. These mailings are designed to reach both experienced and first-time voters, prompting them to take important steps such as updating their registration address, sharing nearby voting locations, or selecting their preferred language for election materials.

These targeted outreach mailings are financially optimized to ensure cost efficiency while maximizing reach and impact. They are often paired with digital engagement tools, such as QR codes linking to the RR/CC official website or interactive online resources. Direct mailing outreach ensures that all voters, regardless of language or location, are aware of their voting options and can confidently participate.



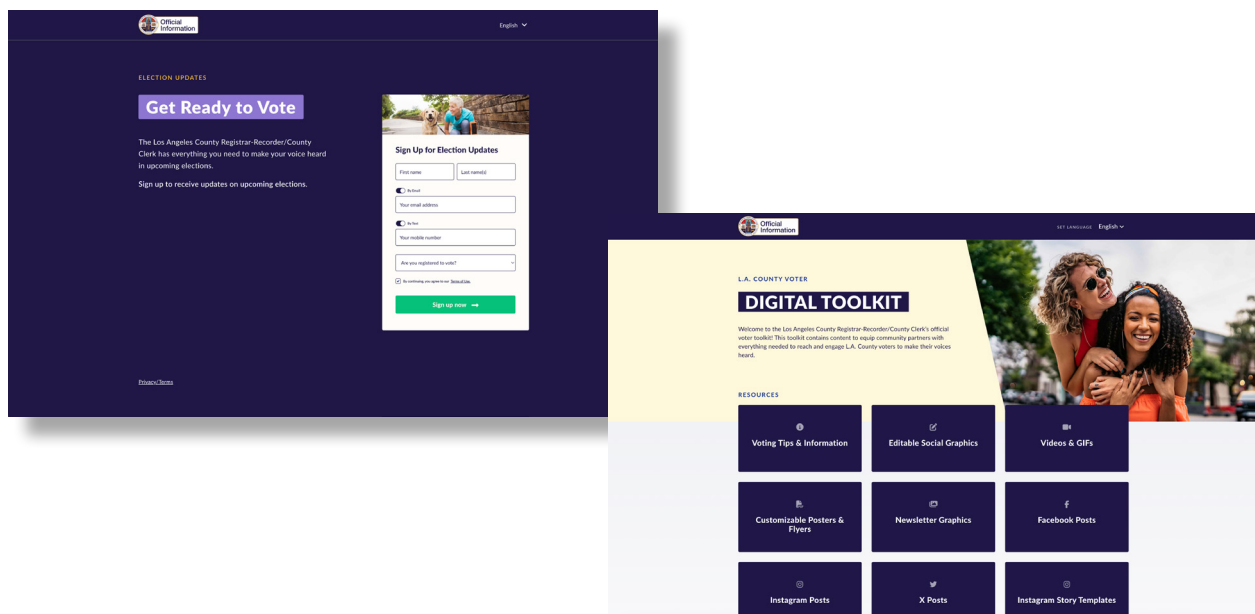
## x. RR/CC Website – LAVOTE.GOV

The official RR/CC website, LAVOTE.GOV, serves as the central hub for all voting and election information in Los Angeles County. It is continuously updated with accurate, accessible, and timely content to ensure voters have the information they need to participate confidently in each election. The site provides critical details on upcoming elections, voter registration, voting options, deadlines, and election security, as well as step-by-step guides for both in-person and Vote by Mail voting. In addition, the website is designed to comply with ADA accessibility standards, incorporates features to support voters with disabilities, and provides content in multiple languages, ensuring equitable access to information for the County's diverse population.

In addition to core election content on LAVOTE.GOV, the RR/CC offers interactive tools and downloadable resources to enhance the voting experience and support community outreach:

- **Make a Plan to Vote Tool:** An interactive online tool that helps voters create a personalized voting plan. Voters can explore their voting options and locate their nearest voting locations— all in one place.
- **Community Digital Toolkit:** A comprehensive website designed for community-based organizations, advocacy groups, and local partners. The toolkit includes multilingual social media graphics, flyers, fact sheets, and key messages that empower partners to conduct their own voter education and outreach.

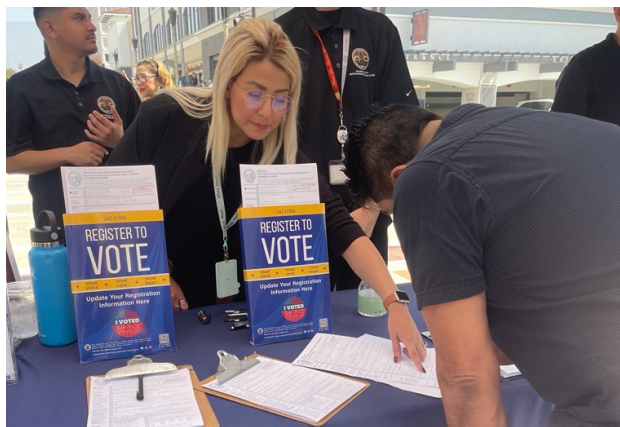
These resources serve as trusted sources of official election information but also as platforms for voter empowerment, enabling residents and community partners to access, share, and act on the information they need to participate in the democratic process.





## xi. Public Education and Outreach

The RR/CC conducts year-round outreach to ensure all eligible voters in Los Angeles County, particularly those in underrepresented and historically low-turnout communities, can register to vote and have access to accurate and culturally relevant election information. The RR/CC team participates in community events and partners with trusted local organizations, and provides resources in multiple languages to eliminate barriers to participation. The RR/CC maintains a strong presence at naturalization ceremonies, offering immediate voter registration opportunities, and at schools where RR/CC hosts election booths, facilitate voting demonstrations, and conduct registration drives to inspire early civic engagement. The RR/CC is present at local city events, partnering with libraries, schools, and colleges.

The RR/CC also provides voter registration training to community-based organizations, equipping them to conduct their own outreach and assist voters directly. These combined efforts, broad public engagement paired with targeted, community-specific strategies, help ensure that every voter is registered and has the tools, resources, and confidence to participate in the electoral process.

## 1-C. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, PUBLIC EDUCATION AND OUTREACH, AND MEDIA BUDGET

The RR/CC's media and outreach budget for Fiscal Year 25-26, running from July 2025 to June 2026, is \$4.125 million. This allocation supports the administration of the June 2, 2026, Statewide Direct Primary Election and funds for early outreach efforts leading into the November 3, 2026, General Election. These resources will be dedicated to delivering a large-scale, multilingual, and multicultural voter education campaign designed to ensure that all County voters and residents are informed of their voting rights, accessible voting options, and the full range of election resources.

## Identifying and Serving Limited-English Proficiency (LEP) Voters

When a person registers to vote, they may request translated election materials in another language. Any voter who makes this request will automatically receive a translated sample ballot and all election materials in their preferred language. In 2020, 2022, and 2024, the RR/CC mailed voter education mailers to all voters, informing them of voting options. Included in these mailers was a postage-paid request form for voters to fill out and return if they wanted to update their language preference and receive translated election materials. In November 2024, RR/CC refined the focus to new registrants. From 2020 to the present, almost 100,000 voters have requested translated voting materials.

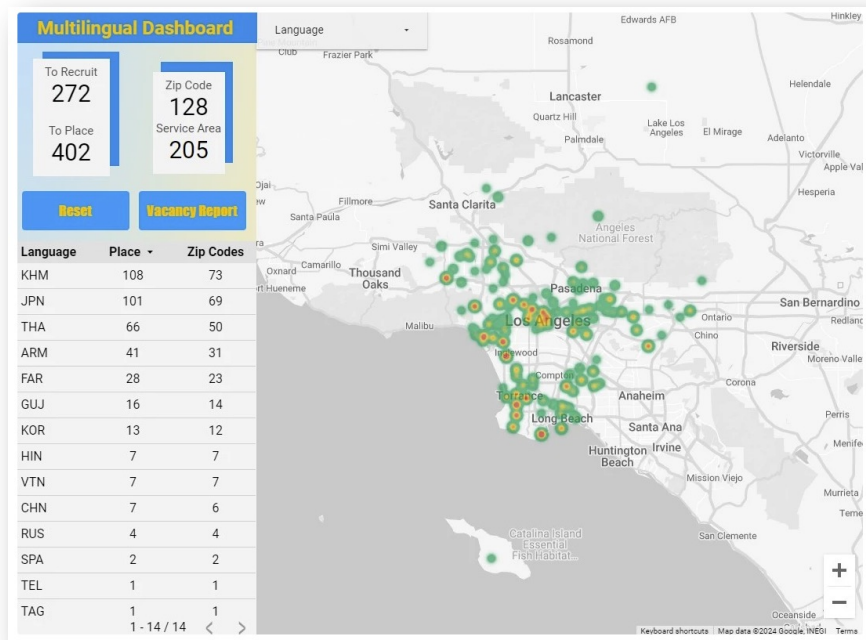
The RR/CC also has a Multilingual Assistance Hotline for voters to request translated election materials or information about Vote Center locations, bilingual voter registration cards, translated Vote by Mail applications, and sample ballot booklets. This hotline is staffed by RR/CC's Language Access team, which provides live bilingual assistance in the 18 required languages through the entire voting period. Voters can reach the Multilingual Hotline by calling the general number, 1 (800) 815-2666, option 3.



The RR/CC has begun piloting the use of direct lines for each language to ensure voters receive service in the needed language throughout the call. The direct lines should reduce the wait time and dropped calls, ensuring voters are better serviced.

The RR/CC has developed a comprehensive targeting data system that integrates demographic data and language assistance requests from multiple sources, including data from the United States Census, the American Community Survey, voter registration applications, and language assistance requests from community groups.

Using this data, the RR/CC generates reports that prioritize multilingual staffing at Vote Centers based on demonstrated language assistance needs. Current data supports assigning Spanish-speaking Election Workers at every Vote Center.



To further ensure language needs are met, the RR/CC continues to enhance recruitment strategies and tools. Most recently, the RR/CC developed a Multilingual Election Worker Recruitment Tool, a series of dashboards providing interactive, filterable maps by language and other data points, creating a visual, shareable resource that makes local staffing needs easier to identify and communicate.



The RR/CC is also evaluating the use of advanced translation technology to strengthen language assistance and communication at Vote Centers. For the November 2024 General Election, the RR/CC piloted the PockeTalk Voice Translator, a device that provides real-time translation in over 84 languages. The pilot was conducted at 10 Vote Centers to assess voter experience, translation accuracy, network readiness, deployment requirements, feasibility, and impact. The RR/CC is now conducting additional testing to evaluate the feasibility of expanding this technology on a larger scale.

## 1-E. DISABILITY ACCESS

The RR/CC is committed to ensuring the full accessibility of elections and continues to take significant steps to survey, recruit, modify, and maintain accessible Vote Centers. The Vote Center model is designed with accessibility in mind by prioritizing the placement of accessible voting locations near communities with higher concentrations of voters with disabilities.

When assessing facilities for use as Vote Centers, sites must meet accessible parking requirements in addition to other accessibility criteria. The RR/CC also enhances access through its Mobile Voting Program, which deploys one-day voting sites in communities where traditional facilities may be limited. These mobile locations expand opportunities for voters with disabilities, rural residents, and others who face barriers to reaching standard Vote Centers.

For voters who are deaf or hard of hearing, all Vote Center locations offer on-demand access to American Sign Language (ASL) video interpreting services. These services are accessible through mobile devices used by Election Workers, allowing real-time communication via ASL interpreters through a trusted vendor specializing in language access solutions.



The RR/CC engages the community through its Community Voter Outreach Committee (CVOC) and its Voting Accessibility Advisory Committee (VAAC). Created in 2006, the VAAC provides guidance to the RR/CC on innovative strategies that improve accessibility and participation. The VAAC plays a vital role in advising on both pre-election planning and post-election review activities, including providing input on the Mobile Voting Program and identifying communities that would benefit the most.

### i. Voting Solutions for All People (VSAP) Prioritized Accessibility into the Design

The County's Ballot Marking Devices, Interactive Sample Ballot, Vote by Mail, and Remote Accessible Vote by Mail provide voters with disabilities additional access and convenience. These tools were developed as core components of the VSAP model through a collaborative, human-centered design process. As part of this process, the RR/CC engaged voters, Election Workers, community organizations, local stakeholders, and subject matter experts in extensive user testing to evaluate accessibility, ease of use, and to consult on technology and security considerations. These tools were designed with 14 core principles in mind. These principles are:

The **Ballot Marking Device (BMD)** is the centerpiece of the VSAP model and remains the only publicly owned voting system in the United States. Los Angeles County Voters can use the BMD when voting in person at any Vote Center or at any Mobile Voting deployment. Each device offers multiple accessibility features to allow voters to customize the experience. Each BMD has adequate space to accommodate voters in wheelchairs or walkers, and its touchscreen display can be adjusted for voters in a sitting or

standing position. For those who are unable to or have difficulty using a touchscreen, the BMD has a tactile keypad for navigating the ballot and making selections. Voters can also adjust the font size, color, and contrast for visibility, and each device includes an audio headset that allows the voter to listen to the ballot with adjustable speed and volume. Both the touchscreen text and audio are available in English and 18 additional languages.

The **Interactive Sample Ballot** is an easy, web-based application that enables voters to mark their sample ballot and create a Poll Pass that can be printed or downloaded on a mobile device. The Poll Pass expedites the in-person voting experience by allowing voters to quickly transfer their selections to the BMD, confirm or modify their selections, and finish the process of casting their paper ballot. The Interactive Sample Ballot is accessible using assistive technology and is available in all eligible languages.



For voters who prefer **Vote by Mail (VBM)**, the County's VBM ballot and Return Envelope were designed for ease of use. The ballot itself features a clear layout, font size, and intuitive design elements that make viewing and marking selections easier for all voters. The Return Envelope includes accessibility guides with tactile notches/holes aligned with the signature line, allowing voters with visual impairments to more easily locate the correct area for signing. In addition, the RR/CC offers **Remote Accessible Vote by Mail**, a web-based application located on the RR/CC's website. Remote Accessible Vote by Mail allows voters to access their ballot in a screen-readable format, use assistive technologies to read and mark their selections, and then print and return the ballot by mail, at a Vote Center, or a Ballot Drop Box.

In 2024, the RR/CC also implemented a new technological solution, enabling voters to use touchscreen devices, such as cellphones and tablets, and the assistive technology on those devices to cure ballots identified with a mismatched or missing signature. This tool will continue to be provided to voters in upcoming elections.

Together, these in-person and Vote by Mail options ensure all voters have access to an independent, private, and secure voting experience.

## SECTION 2 – VOTE CENTERS AND BALLOT DROP BOX LOCATIONS

The Voters Choice Act requires counties to establish convenient, safe, and easily accessible Vote Centers and Ballot Drop Boxes. The law sets minimum standards for location selection, the number of days, and the operating hours. The RR/CC conducts extensive research and analysis to identify the best locations and launches a comprehensive outreach campaign to ensure voters are aware of them. Vote Center and Drop Box locations are published before each election at LAVOTE.GOV and are also provided directly to voters through election mailers.

### 2-A. VOTE CENTERS

#### i. Vote Center Placement

Determining the most suitable Vote Center locations requires a robust, data-driven process that integrates State and local requirements with local spatial and socioeconomic conditions while forecasting human behaviors and patterns. The RR/CC utilizes a comprehensive strategy to identify ideal Vote Center locations for its communities that goes beyond the minimum VCA criteria.

The RR/CC incorporates the following 15 VCA criteria when determining the ideal Vote Center placement:

- Geographically Isolated Communities
- Low-Income Communities
- Limited English Speaking and Language Minority Communities
- Low Vehicle Ownership Communities
- Voter Residential Population Centers
- Proximity to Employment Centers
- Voters with Disabilities
- Unregistered Eligible Voters
- Low Vote by Mail Usage
- High Propensity Registered Voters
- Emerging Voters
- Transit Access
- Traffic Congestion and Patterns
- Publicly Accessible Parking
- Public or Private University or College Campus

#### ii. Facility Assessment for Los Angeles County

The VCA has established a formula for determining the number of Vote Centers based on the number of registered voters. Counties are instructed to provide one 11-day Vote Center for every 50,000 registered voters and one 4-day Vote Center for every 10,000 registered voters. (See Election Code Section 4005(a)(10)(l)(vi)(l)).


Based on the VCA formulas, Los Angeles County is required to have approximately 116 Vote Centers to be open 10 days prior to Election Day for the June 2, 2026, Statewide Direct Primary Election; the RR/CC's goal is to open at least 120 during this period. Additionally, three days prior to and including

Election Day, the VCA requires a minimum of 582 Vote Centers to be open in the County; the RR/CC's goal is to open 640 Vote Centers.

To determine the number and placement of Vote Centers for each election, the RR/CC uses a comprehensive four-phase methodology:

- **Phase 1: Geographic Spread** – Service areas are created using the 15 VCA criteria to ensure a balanced geographic distribution of Vote Centers. These service areas allow the County to align with VCA principles and statutory requirements.
- **Phase 2: GIS Review** – The RR/CC's Geographic Information Systems (GIS) team develops heat maps based on population density and VCA suitability criteria. The maps allow for overlays of all potential Vote Centers within service areas. The RR/CC also evaluates areas with high concentrations of language minority groups identified by the California Secretary of State under Section 14201 of the California Elections Code, and neighborhoods with distinct community identities (e.g.: Koreatown and Chinatown). Communities with sizeable populations of voters with disabilities are assessed using tools such as the Center for Inclusive Democracy's Voting Location and Outreach Tool.
- **Phase 3: Voter Behavior** – Historical voter turnout, Vote by Mail return rates and proximity to existing or proposed Vote Centers are reviewed to anticipate voter needs and preferences.
- **Phase 4: Final Review** – Executive and jurisdictional stakeholders review the proposed plan, identifying any service gaps and determining whether additional Vote Centers are required.

Los Angeles County RR/CC has developed materials to explain the basic requirements for a location to be considered as a Vote Center:

- Smaller rooms could be considered on a case by case basis.

**HOURS:**

- **Early voting period:** Facilities must be accessible from 9am-8pm.
- **Election Day:** Facilities must be accessible from 6am-10pm or later to allow for processing voters still in line.

**DATA & ELECTRICAL:**

- Data capacity for Electronic Pollbooks to connect to network. Preference is to utilize facility's data port but is not required.
- Electrical infrastructure to power Ballot Marking Devices.
- RR/CC representatives will conduct a site assessment to determine viability.

**Vote Center Capacity**

Requirements are subject to change at any time.

**ACCESSIBILITY:**

- Accessible walking path from parking lot/street to vote center room (wide enough path; ramp; etc.).
- Accessible parking for voters with disabilities (or ability to cone off 1 or 2 parking spaces to designate for accessibility usage).
- RR/CC representatives will conduct a site assessment to ensure accessibility.

**PARKING:**

- Designated or available parking for all voters.
- If only street parking is available, must consider street sweeping days and work with local agencies for exceptions as needed.

**COMPENSATION:**

- Compensation can be provided to cover operational costs including security, electrical, staffing, etc. (Up to \$300/daily).

Once potential Vote Centers are identified, the RR/CC conducts a comprehensive accessibility survey utilizing the California Secretary of State's Polling Place Accessibility Guidelines, developed in partnership with the California Department of Rehabilitation. Based on the survey findings, the RR/CC creates a Mitigation Packet for each location that may present accessibility barriers. Each packet includes:

1. A **Mitigation Measures Plan** detailing temporary solutions to address obstacles and instructions for deployment.
2. A **Signage Plan** guiding voters to the voting area, including alternate accessible route where necessary.
3. A detailed site map of the voting area.

Locations with significant accessibility challenges are deprioritized to ensure the most suitable, accessible, and available Vote Centers are selected for each election.

### iii. Vote Center Hours of Operation

Vote Centers are open for 10 consecutive days before and on Election Day, giving voters two full weekends to cast a ballot at any location. Prior to Election Day, Vote Centers are open daily from 10:00 AM to 7:00 PM. On Election Day, those hours extended from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

## 2-B. BALLOT DROP BOXES



Ballot Drop Boxes are a critical component of providing accessible voting options, particularly for voters who live in rural areas, travel frequently, or work outside the County. Under the VCA, Ballot Drop Boxes must be secure, accessible, and located as near as possible to established public transportation routes. They must be available during regular business hours, no later than 29 days before and continuing through Election Day. Additionally, there must be at least one Ballot Drop Box available for a minimum of 12 hours per day, including regular business hours.

Drop Box locations are selected using VCA criteria and a data-driven service area model similar to the Vote Center siting process. The RR/CC's GIS team creates service areas to ensure a balanced geographical distribution of locations across the County.



For the June 2, 2026 Statewide Direct Primary Election, the VCA requires a minimum of 389 Ballot Drop Boxes. The RR/CC currently operates 400 Drop Boxes across the County and, to maintain consistency with previous Countywide elections, will install an additional 20 Ballot Drop Boxes, bringing the total to more than 420 Drop Boxes. These new sites are undergoing the same rigorous review and assessment as Vote Center. In addition, all Vote Centers also serve as Ballot Drop Off locations.

## SECTION 3 – VOTE CENTER LAYOUT, EQUIPMENT, AND STAFFING

### 3-A. STAFFING LOGISTICS AND MULTILINGUAL SERVICES

Los Angeles County’s Vote Center model is designed to accommodate various levels of participation throughout the County. The County deploys Vote Centers using three approximate size variations: standard, large, and extra-large (see Table 2). Each Vote Center has a range of 12 to 26 Election Workers, depending on its size. Bilingual speakers are also assigned to fulfill language requirements for communities or service areas in or adjacent to a Vote Center. Voters needing assistance in American Sign Language can request the service at any Vote Center – trained interpreters are available in person or via technology to assist.

The following are the RR/CC’s identified Election Worker roles at Vote Centers:

- **Lead** – Oversees all activities at the Vote Center, including opening and closing of the Vote Center, addressing questions/issues, and delivering ballots to the Check-In Centers daily.
- **Assistant Lead** – Assists with all Lead duties and assumes Lead role in Lead’s absence.
- **Line/Curbside Monitors** – Greets voters, answers general questions, and directs them to the appropriate station (e.g., Check-In-Clerk, Vote by Mail Clerk, etc.). Ensures the line is adequately maintained by assisting and directing voters to the Quick Check-In Code and/or ISB process and providing instructions on how to use the BMD. A handout listing nearby Vote Centers will be readily available to voters in the event of long lines or wait times. The second monitor covers the Curbside Voting area every 15 minutes to check if there is a voter waiting for assistance and provides the voter with instructions on Curbside Voting.

- **Check-In Clerk** – Checks in voters, provides them with their ballot, and directs them to the voting area.
- **Voting Area Monitor** – Directs voters to available BMD, troubleshoots basic BMD issues, and directs voters to Vote by Mail/Provisional Clerk to receive “I Voted” sticker.
- **Field Support Technician** – Troubleshoots equipment issues at the Vote Center (e.g. BMDs, ePollBooks, Routers, etc.). Assists with the chain of custody for all election equipment and records wait times, ballot inventory, and incidents into the RR/CC’s systems.
- **Provisional/Vote by Mail Clerk** – Assists provisional and CVR voters, receives Vote by Mail envelopes from voters, and issues “I Voted” stickers (discretionary position).



### 3-B. VOTE CENTER ASSISTANCE

Every Vote Center in the County is equipped with BMDs, which are fully accessible voting devices that allow all voters to mark their ballot independently and privately. All Election Workers receive training on assisting voters with the voting process, including focused instruction on the accessibility features of the BMD. Additional accessibility tools available at every Vote Center include magnifying glasses, signature guides, pen grips, 20/20 pens, and curbside voting services. Election Workers check every 15 minutes for voters who may need curbside assistance.





Curbside voting is available at all Vote Centers for voters who may have difficulty entering a Vote Center. This service allows voters to cast their ballot from the convenience of their vehicle by calling a telephone number that is clearly posted in a designated area outside a Vote Center. An Election Worker then brings voting materials to the voter's vehicle, enabling them to independently and privately mark their ballot. Voters can mark their ballot using the ISB or a paper write-in ballot.

### 3-C. VOTE CENTER LAYOUT

As mentioned in Section 3-A, Vote Centers vary in size. The number of BMDs at each site is determined based on the room layout and the location's unique specifications. To ensure consistency, each Vote Center will receive a layout diagram showing proper BMD placement, and to allow each voter to cast a private and independent ballot. Layouts will also account for accessibility needs and will be adjusted to accommodate the varying dimensions and configurations of each location.

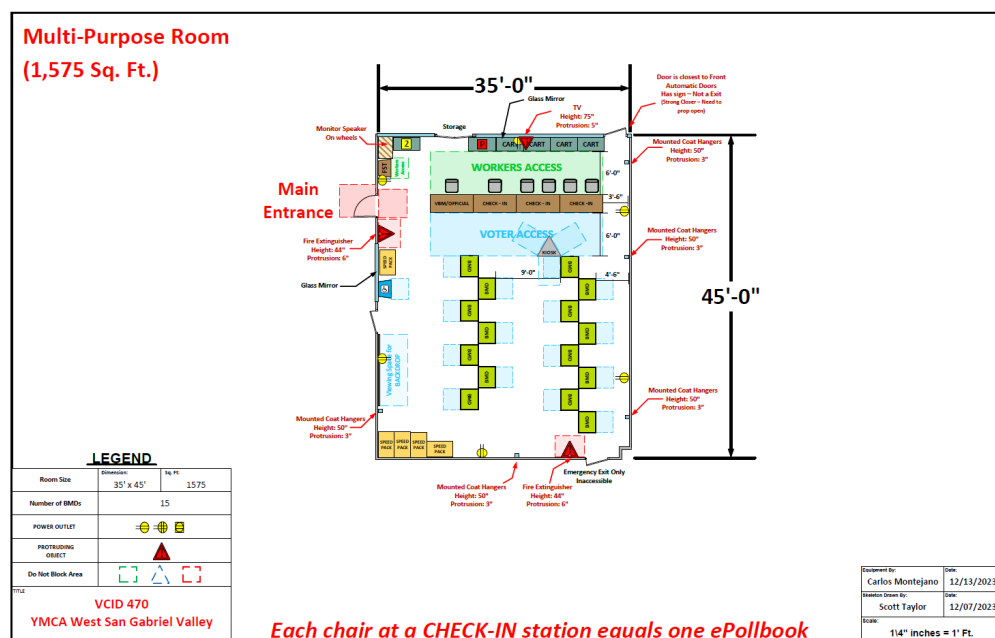


Figure 3. Sample layout of a large capacity Vote Center.

## SECTION 4 – SECURITY AND CONTINGENCY PLAN

### 4-A. SECURITY METHODS AND STANDARDS

All voting conducted at Vote Centers complies with State-established security standards, the RR/CC's security procedures, the California Elections Code, and the VSAP Solution Use Procedures. This includes, but is not limited to, ensuring all equipment at the Vote Center is sealed, delivered, stored, and operated in compliance with these regulations and that the full chain of custody is documented for all equipment and ballot handling.

Procedures also require that at least two Election Workers be present whenever the site is open. To ensure BMDs have not been tampered with, Election Workers must print a report from each BMD both before the Vote Center opens and after it closes to verify that no ballots were cast while the site was closed.

## **4-B. VOTE CENTER SUPPORT**

All staff, including those working the Vote Centers and those providing technical and compliance support, will attend extensive training on the operation of the voting equipment, setting up a Vote Center, assisting and processing voters, securing sensitive equipment, and proper procedures in case of an emergency.

All Vote Center Leads and Field Support Technicians (FST) are issued smartphones to maintain direct communication with elections staff. These devices allow for real-time updates and alerts from the RR/CC and include security features for electronic pollbooks that enable remote shutdown, configuration changes, and locking if lost or stolen.

The RR/CC also operates a call center to provide technical and procedural support. All Election Workers and support staff are trained on emergency procedures and receive a detailed manual outlining Vote Center operations and contingency protocols.

## **4-C. CYBERSECURITY**

Protecting election integrity through robust cybersecurity is a critical priority for the RR/CC. The RR/CC's Information Technology team utilizes a Governance, Risk, and Compliance (GRC) framework that aligns with industry standards and best practices to enhance organizational resilience. Continuous monitoring is conducted through a dedicated Elections Security Operations Center, enabling proactive responses to suspicious or malicious activity.

Key security measures include:

- Centrally managed ePollbooks, whitelisted on the routers
- Encrypted connections ensuring security at rest, in motion, and in transit
- Monitoring of all network connections between all election-related connected devices via a centralized operations center
- Direct communication with various cybersecurity agencies at state and federal level (Secretary of State, Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Department of Homeland Security and other local and national entities)
- Incident response protocols
- Shared keys are changed for every election.

- VSAP software solutions (VSAP Ballot Layout, BMD Manager, BMD, and Tally) are housed in air-gapped networks, with no physical or wireless connections to the County network or the internet.

#### 4-D. CONTINGENCY PLAN



The RR/CC maintains a robust contingency plan to respond to disruptions at Vote Centers:

- If a single Vote Center is significantly impacted, a Pop-Up Vote Center, equipped with staff and voting equipment, will be deployed immediately. In the interim, voters will be redirected to nearby sites.
- When necessary, the RR/CC will notify law enforcement, the Secretary of State's office, and the media to ensure voters receive accurate and timely updates.
- If a natural disaster or other incident affects a Vote Center or Ballot Drop Box, supplemental signage, notifications, and staff will guide voters to alternate locations. As part of preparedness efforts, if a Vote Center loses electrical power, RR/CC is equipped with mobile generators and UPS backup power systems to ensure voting equipment remains operational in the event of an outage.
- For the 2025 Special Election, RR/CC worked with trained staff and volunteers of the L.A. County Commission on Human Relations to launch a pilot project of deploying Election Resource Liaisons (ERLs) to accompany RR/CC Troubleshooter staff to Vote Centers. ERLs, who are trained and experienced in de-escalation techniques, are available to work with the Troubleshooter to address activities that threaten to disrupt election activities, which may involve law enforcement or civilian protesters.

If all activities at a Vote Center must cease for the voting period, Election Workers immediately secure all voting equipment and account for all voting materials in compliance with California Elections Code and the Ballot Manufacturing and Finishing guidelines. The RR/CC will work to open a replacement Vote Center and widely communicate the location to the public.

In the event of an emergency at the Ballot Processing Center in the City of Industry, where ballots are processed, scanned and tabulated, the RR/CC has a disaster recovery system in place. This backup facility, located in Downey, ensures continuity of ballot scanning and tabulation.

## **SECTION 5 – MOVING FORWARD**

The California Voters Choice Act requires Los Angeles County to review and update its Election Administration Plan every four years. Los Angeles County’s electorate continues to grow and become more diverse. The RR/CC continues to be agile, flexible, and responsive, adjusting this plan as needed to best serve County voters.

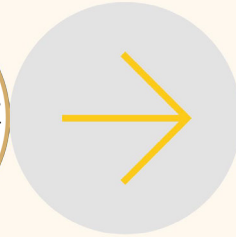

## Introduction & Overview

Following the 2024 General Election, the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk conducted the voter experience survey to evaluate satisfaction, preferences, and trust in the election process. This survey collected responses from voters who cast their ballots through different methods, including Vote by Mail (VBM) via USPS, VBM at Ballot Drop Boxes, VBM Vote Center Drop-Offs, and Vote Center In-Person Voting.

- **93.85%** trusted that their ballot was safe and secure.



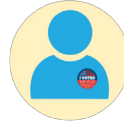

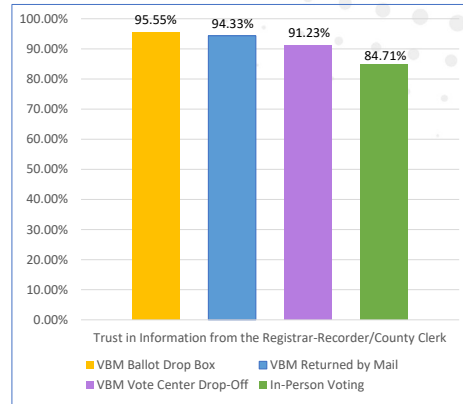

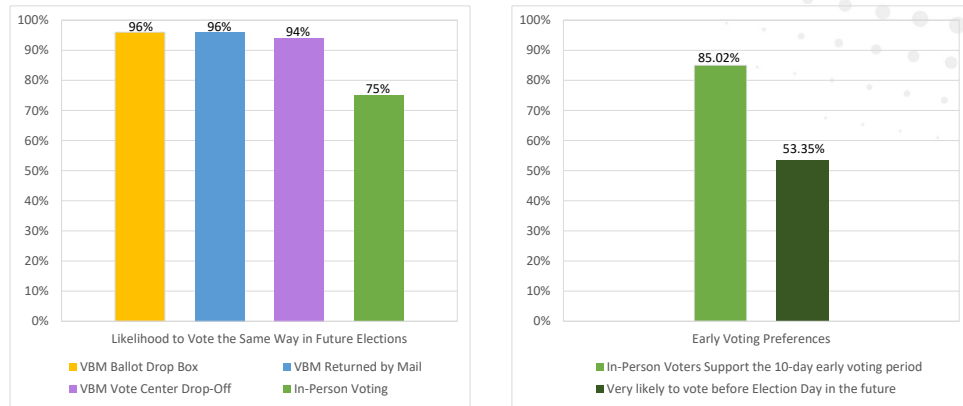

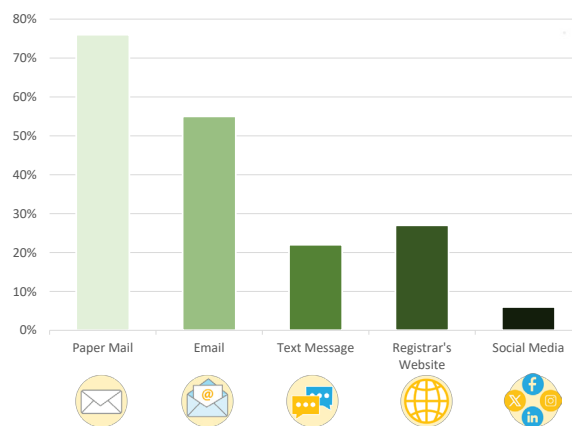

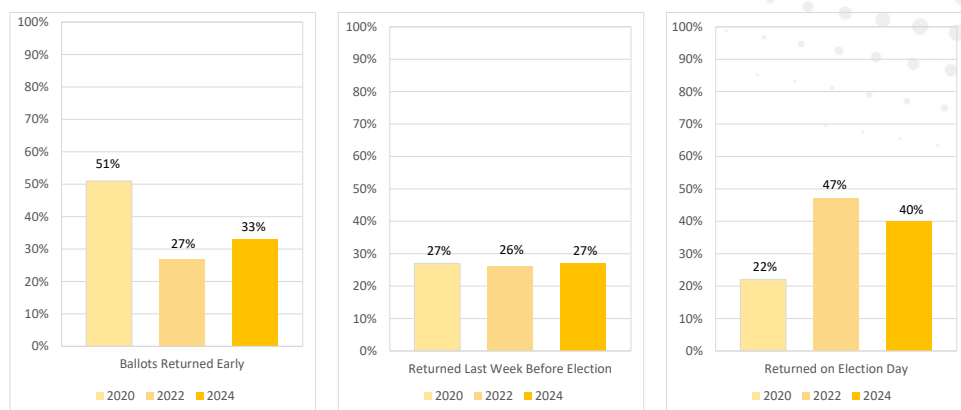
